The whirlwind that started in 2018 continued at an even greater pace in 2019.

Our most exiting achievement was the conversion of a double-decker into a Learning Bus, a dream that started 3 years ago. We are hugely indebted to the **Reece Foundation** for giving us the money to buy a bus and to so many people who helped and supported the crowdfunding campaign. The Learning Bus is now on the road going to schools and community events offering various activities. We even had a movie night on the bus for our volunteers.

Our 6-week STEM Challenge Programme to schools has expanded, involving **197** children in an enquiry-based science project, thanks to Kirsty, our STEM Engagement Manager.

We are grateful to Newcastle Fund again for supporting our Learning Hubs and a Big Thank You to all our learners, volunteers, parents for the honest and great feedback and to Iram and Eve for collecting and collating it all every quarter.

With some EU-funding, we were able to offer 9-month placements to **3 EVS volunteers**, Sasha from Russia, Marie from France and Marta from Spain. They have enriched our activities each with their unique skills and enthused us with their culture.

Our youth group @WEYDA embarked on another social action project looking at **Fake News** and how ordinary people come across false information everywhere. This year-long project will finish with the production of a toolkit for teachers. On top of that, the group is receiving a branding face-lift by none other than **M&C Saatchi**, the global advertising agency.

To all the children, young people, parents, volunteers, Learning Hub Coordinators Fathima, Stella, Eve and Kate, assistants Olivia, Rukhsaar and Melissa, Code Club Leader Moeez, I am again filled with pride of all your achievements. Last but not least, I want to thank my daughter, Busola Afolabi, for her passion and determination these past years to changing Success4All to what it has now become.



### *What does the future hold for Success4All?*

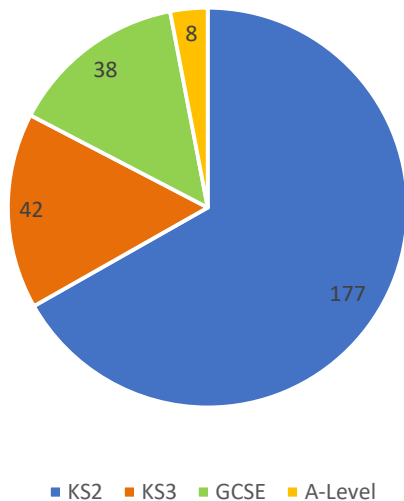

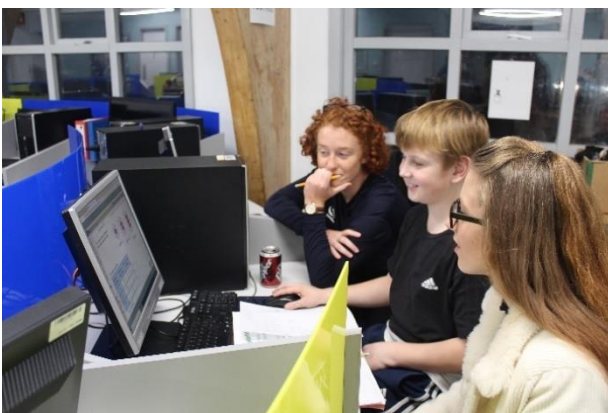
### Meadow Well Hub

#### Tutor of the Term

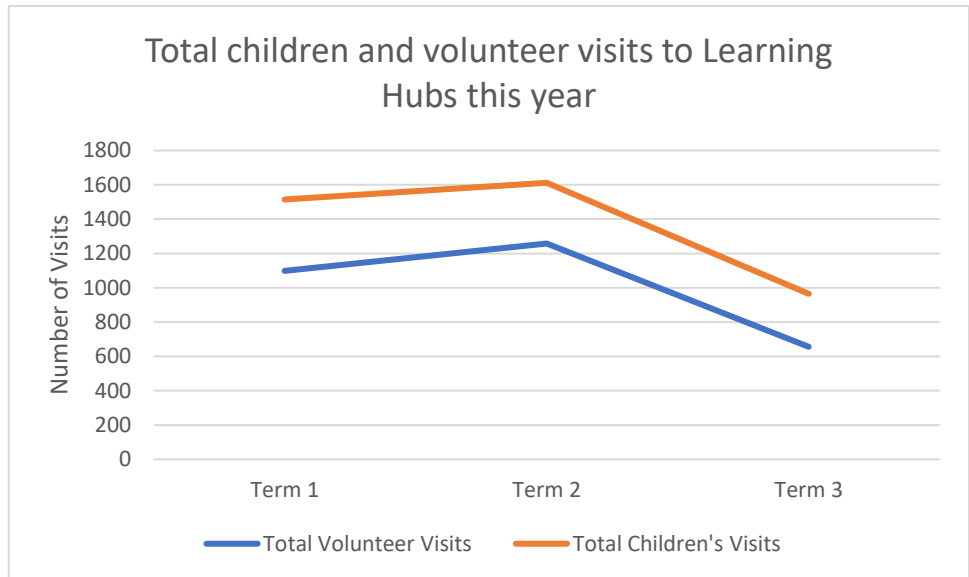

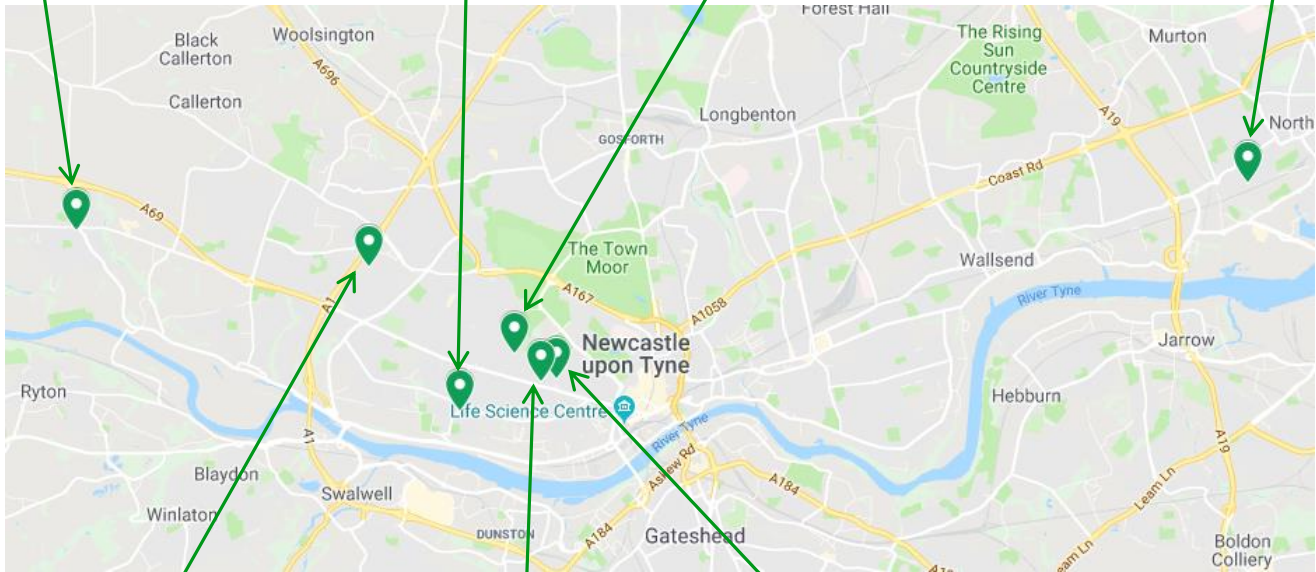

If we don't understand something I can ask the volunteer. If there's a word I don't understand I can ask i.e. what waxing and waning means - which are phases of the moon."

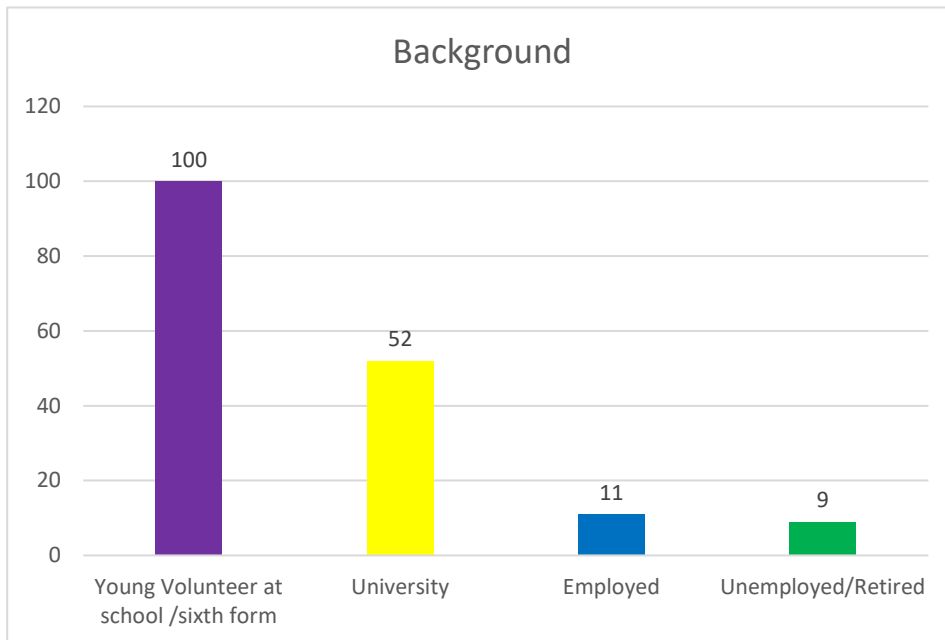

**58** said they met new people

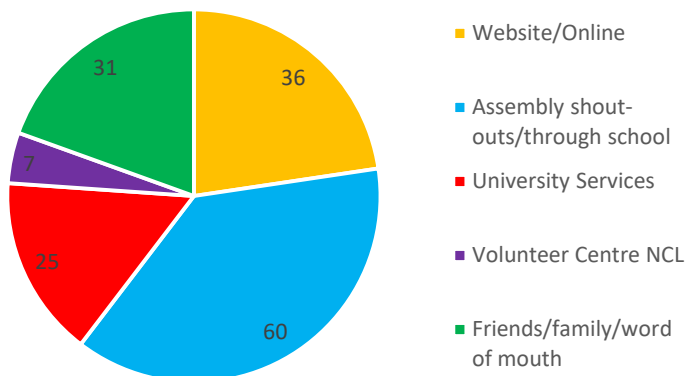
**64** said they gained confidence (note that those who said no reported they were already confident)

The most popular places volunteers are recruited from are: Newcastle University, Northumbria University, Sacred Heart Sixth Form, Emmanuel College, St. Cuthbert's Sixth Form and Ponteland High School. We also have a number of volunteers from Queen Alexandra Sixth Form in North Tyneside.

This year **30** Volunteers completed the Level 3 AQA accreditation, totalling at **215** since 2010. Also, this year **33** volunteers received reference letters from us.

"I feel more **confident** in a classroom situation now, working with children, and more confident in myself. I am more open to taking opportunities. I gained confidence in public speaking and 1-2-1 tutoring, time-keeping and active listening." - Volunteer

Hours given by volunteers totalled **7,459** equalling **£58,403** of in-kind support!

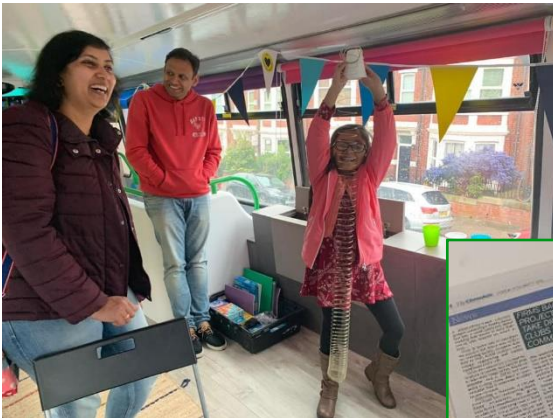
# The Learning Bus

The Learning Bus is definitely one of Success4All's most exciting projects to date and it has been a wonderful rollercoaster in its first 9 months. Many members of the team now know all sorts of information about large vehicle maintenance, engines, electrics and DVLA regulations! We are very excited to continue developing the Learning Bus as our key new outreach tool to reach many more children, young people and families across the North East.



Following our Channel 4 debut on *George Clarke's Amazing Spaces* (10th February 2019), we are also excited to have appeared in 2 local newspapers, *The Chronicle* and *The Journal* and a local voluntary magazine, *Inform by NCVS*.

The Learning Bus has now been used for a range of different events, from being a community space as a Learning Hub to a science experiment workshop to a cinema for our volunteer party. All of these different events showcase how multi-functional our new bus can be, and has given us the perfect opportunity to find out what works well on the bus and exactly what will work best on the bus in the future.

# Clubs

## STEM Club

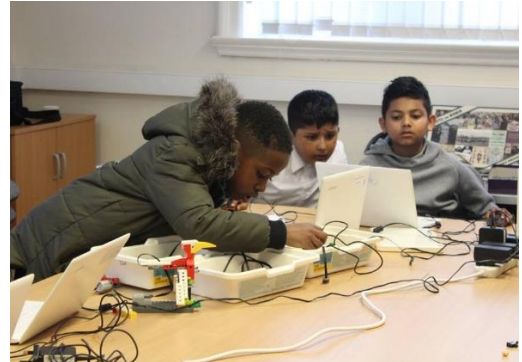
Recently at STEM Club, children have investigated materials for spacesuits; learnt about dinosaur fossils and made their own; *investigated* how to make the best teabag; tested toothpaste recipes and created art from chromatography. The STEM club was also “trapped on a desert island” for a series of weeks where the children experimented with how they could use the limited materials on the island to keep themselves alive and escape the island. This included making clean water, producing a rope out of plastic bags they might find on the “beach” to catch fish, making paper for our message in a bottle and building a boat to escape.

## Code Clubs

In our sixth year of running Code Clubs, they continue to be a popular, creative and collaborative spaces for children and young people to *explore programming and technology*.



In Code Club, children create games using Scratch, a visual block-based programming language. As well as this, children can also try their hand at building animations and websites as well as write code to control Lego robots and make portable gadgets with micro:bits.

## Fake News and Propaganda project – WEYDA

The WEYDA group have explored, through guidance of experts, how to spot the difference and hope to teach others too using a toolkit and app they will develop soon. The next stage in the project is to put on events in our local area to understand the views of others.

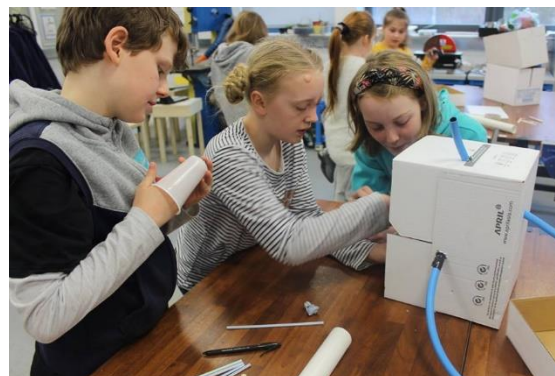


This year, current members have had a *94%* attendance to sessions.

# STEM Challenge

STEM Challenge has continued to grow and develop this year with a **216%** increase on the number of children taking part! We are able to offer these projects to schools with a huge thanks to the support of the Reece Foundation, and for the Energy STEM Challenge Northern Gas Networks and Northern Powergrid's Community Partnering Fund.

Our STEM Challenges take place over 6 weeks. In the first 5 weeks, our STEM engagement manager Kirsty delivers practical activities in the classroom, *engaging and exploring with groups*, developing key investigation, teamwork and communication skills. In the final week, a bespoke trip to a leading North East STEM company or university allows children to discover that the problems and challenges they encountered in their projects are also faced by those currently working as *scientists, engineers and people in STEM jobs*.

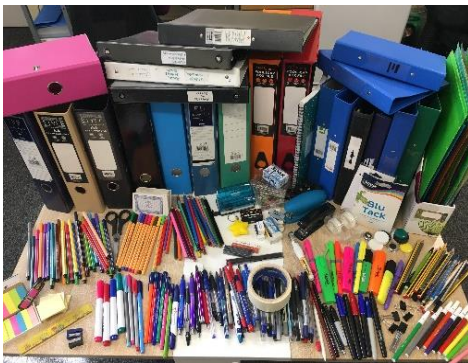
# Success Stories

## Gabriella

## Anya

When Anya first started she found maths quite difficult so wanted to work on it.

Since then Anya has completed a 6-week 1-2-1 block. She has worked with the volunteer Emelia specifically to *strengthen her abilities in Maths*.

The 1-2-1 is where a volunteer, young person and parent all agree to a goal that can be worked towards. In this case it was improving in maths.

“I was struggling on fractions and counting in powers of 10. I now feel confident.

It's better working 1-2-1 as they can help you more.” - Anya

*Anya is now moving up a level in her maths work!*



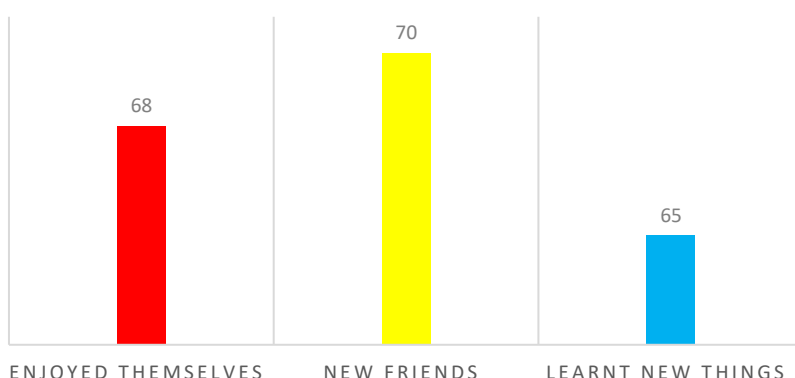
# Summer School 2018

Summer School provided children, young people and young volunteers with *a safe, fun and stimulating environment* where they could make friends. It acted as a low-cost alternative to childcare allowing parents to continue working.

The 2018 theme was *STEM Around the World*. We ran activities linked to scientists or engineers from different countries. To add in a language element, games such as obstacle race, treasure hunt, best off were with *French, German and Spanish* instructions. We used *SOLE* to learn about different cultures in a creative way, using challenges and Skype Meetings with Grannies from *Belgium, Sierra Leone and India*. In the afternoon, everyone was outside. They were given the option of the following activities; sport, cooking, music, dance, coding, gardening and upcycling, cycling, and mini trips out to local parks, farms, and museums.

On each Friday we went on *a big trip out*. Week 1 was to Gibside National Park. We explored the grounds and conquered the low ropes challenge! Week 2 was to Beamish Museum. We discovered what it would be like to live in the olden days. Week 3 was to Alnwick Gardens. We experienced the beautiful gardens, got soaked by the water fountains and learnt all about poisonous plants! **To find out more about what we've been up to and see photos of all of the activities check out our Facebook page – Success4All.**



We measured the impact our Summer School had on *improved income and work-life balance of parents/carers*. 85 parents said they were able to continue or take on more hours and 25 said they used it for study, job search, carry out work in the house.

As always, we are astounded how much we can achieve with so little. It is like the Bible story of Feeding the 5000 with 5 loaves and 2 fish. Last financial year, we achieved a turnover of **£162,315** with grants and self-generated income. With this, we employed **4** staff, paid services of **5** Learning Hub Coordinators and **1** Club Leaders, **8** summer school workers in order to benefit **600** children and young people and **172** trained volunteers.
