Walker Technology College Statistics

Over the year 2013 – 2014 Success4All have supported a total number of 242 learners since September 2013. The young people visited us 2160 times at an average of 62 times p/w and have been supported by volunteers 660 times at an average of 18 times p/w.

10 students took an additional language exam this year; 8 GCSE students and 2 A-Level students.

Spanish Textiles

As part of the Real Translation Project in partnership with Newcastle University, language students from Newcastle University and students from the Learning Hub at Walker Technology College began their Spanish Textiles Project.

So far, they have worked together to make a Spanish-English glossary and phrase book for students of Textiles. The students of Walker Technology participating in the project had the opportunity to visit Newcastle University, and spoke in front of a large audience in a lecture room about the project!

Stage two of the project is taking place during summer school, where the group will be running a textiles workshop for 11 year olds, making a textiles product with Spanish instructions.

The club gives the opportunity for young people of Walker who may be excluded from learning a foreign language a chance to do something practical linked purposefully to their vocational study and explores new ways of learning.
